Submissions Must Include:

The theme of your play. For example: a comedy based on the challenges communicating with government, or serious drama dealing with financial stress etc.

A brief description of the key challenge in the play. For example: dealing with a failing cell phone during an emergency, or a deadline that has very serious consequences if not met etc. A description of the character(s) involved.

An outline of a setting. For example: outside in a park or living room of parent's house. If you happen to already have a suitable script please submit a copy.

Guidelines For Submissions:

Must be an original work, never performed on stage and practical for a stage presentation at Theatre Arts Guild

No previous writing experience required.

Collaborators that wish to enter should not exceed two writers.

Maximum run time is 30 MINUTES.

Keep characters to a maximum of 4 (doubling is okay).

Technical lights and sound MUST be basic.

Set pieces MUST be few and simple. NO LARGE SET CHANGES.

There will be TWO performances; April 21 and 22, 2017.

The Selection Process:

Producers of Playwrights @TAG will select three (3) plays from the submissions. Just like auditioning for a role in a play, you must be prepared to submit but not necessarily be chosen for production. For more information, contact Angela Butler at executive-producer@tagtheatre.com

ONE OR MORE - COLLABORATION IN WRITING PLAYS

Expanding Your Theatre Vocabulary - the 63rd in a continuing series

pening this piece for just a second wearing my TAG Archivist hat, I have to tell you that this is a first for the Guild – a play with five authors! I was a little hesitant when reading the script therefore, wondering how seamless a play could be with five contributors to the plot and story line. Turns out, the play reads well and if you had not seen the names on the cover, it could be taken to be the work of one author.

hat Jennifer Brewin, Leah Cherniak, Ann-Marie MacDonald, Alisa Palmer and Martha Ross have a good deal in common I'm sure contributes to the smooth sequence of the text. All have acting and directing experience; all have long been involved in the writing and promotion of new theatre in Canada, particularly theatre which champions women and their role in society. Leah Cherniak and Martha Ross were the cofounders of Theatre Columbus in Toronto (now Common Boots Theatre); Jennifer Brewin also has ties to this theatre. Alisa Palmer (the spouse of Ann-Marie MacDonald) is the Artistic Director of the National Theatre School of Canada (English Section). Ms. MacDonald, the only one with ties to Nova Scotia (her father is from New Waterford, her mother from Sydney) has found considerable success as an actor, playwright and novelist. TAG presented her best-known play Goodnight Desdemona (Good Morning Juliet) in October of 2009.

The image of the lone playwright scribbling away in a garret, or hitting the keys on a typewriter in a shabby hotel room, has faded in recent years. Gaining popularity is the collaborative approach to writing, or at least,

providing opportunities for writers to present scripts for discussion before an audience. For the audience, it's the chance to make comments or suggestions about the writing. For the playwright, it's the chance to gauge the overall acceptance (or rejection) of his/her work and determine what characters, scenes, incidents, etc., were successful or were found confusing or unnecessary. DaPoPo Theatre in Halifax has given authors this experience in recent years through their Live-in Theatre Festival and Playwrights Atlantic Resource Centre (PARC) has a similar programme in its Playwrights Cabaret series. Such opportunities are now a staple of theatre degree programmes at universities and (in keeping with our living in the computer age)

there's even software for collaborating on writing

a play with anyone anywhere in the world.

'm sure by now those of you who read my notes know of my admiration for Shakespeare. So was the Bard part of a Collective? Well, not exactly, but we do know of one instance in which he contributed to the revision of a play which had already been worked on by several writers (and such revision was standard for the time there's no copyright in existence remember!). The play was Sir Thomas More (c1590-1593), whose principal authors have been identified as Henry Chettle and Anthony Munday, Chettle and Munday wrote dozens of plays in collaboration with friends and other actors, as did Thomas Dekker (c.1572- c.1632), a writer featured in readings held by Villain's Theatre in Halifax. By the end of the 16th century, there were ten major theatres in London, plus dozens of smaller venues (usually in the yard of an inn) whose programmes changed weekly. Demand for new material was high (and by how many authors was not a consideration!).
