Expanding Your Theatre Vocabulary The 55th in a Continuing Series

sometimes envy our audience members who are seeing a particular play for the first time. I am a member of the Artistic Planning Committee for the Guild, a group of five which supports TAG's Artistic Director (Rayna Smith-Camp) in compiling the season of five plays. The members of this Committee read all the plays eventually selected so, in one sense, no piece presented at TAG is new to me. My enjoyment, therefore, comes from watching how the Director and his/her actors make live the text which with I am already familiar. And since I have been a member of TAG for some time, the reappearance of a piece in a future season means I get to witness a different interpretation under a different hand.

Those are my expectations, as I settle into my seat for the final Dress Rehearsal of each of our offerings. But as audience members, what do you expect when you attend a TAG performance? Will you enjoy the interaction between the characters, or, since our next play, Death by Design is a mystery, will you be listening carefully for any clues tucked into the text by the playwright? If the play you are watching happens to be by Agatha Christie, you can be

sure the clues are there, though whether you can distinguish them is not always certain! You'll notice Mrs. Christie's influence in Mr. Urbinati's piece – the setting of the country mansion, the tension which builds and is exacerbated by (gasp!) the cutting of the telephone wire. Rob Urbinati also tips his hat to the talent of Noel Coward, visible in the assembly of ill-matched house guests and visitors, all to later be revealed as having a motive for murder and not afraid of expressing welcome or unwelcome opinions to their companions.

Noel Coward has proved a particular favourite of TAG audiences over the years. Hay Fever was presented in the fifth season in 1936 and fifty years later in 1986. Nude with Violin has also been presented twice, as has Present Laughter. On the TAG stage, Agatha Christie is well represented with A Witness for the Prosecution (1957), Unexpected Guest (1977) and – yes – The Mousetrap (1972).

If you are familiar with Agatha Christie's work
— whether it be novels or plays — you will
know that you must wait until the last act for the
murderer to be revealed. There is such a reveal in
Death by Design, but there's a twist too, which I'm
sure you don't wish me to explain — Do you?
