## DICKENS & THEATRE

#### Expanding Your Theatre Vocabulary - the 62nd in a continuing series

Charles Dickens – a thespian? Indeed, though his experiences as an actor, manager, producer and playwright have long been forgotten and eclipsed by his fame as a novelist.

From his youthful years, Dickens was an enthusiastic participant in amateur performances (often held in support of charitable causes connected with hospitals or charities benefitting children). Even though titled amateur theatricals, the cast for such presentations often included professional actors and enjoyed the support of distinguished members of society (including Queen Victoria, to whom, apparently, Dickens offered some hints as to the solving of *The Mystery of Edwin Drood*. For some reason unknown, Her Majesty didn't pursue the offer!).

In spite of his obsession with the theatre (he made the boast that for three years, he witnessed a performance every day!), Dickens' own plays and plays in collaboration with other writers (notably Wilkie Collins, the author of The Moonstone and The Woman in White) brought him little success. On the other hand his novels, nonfiction, essays and speeches made him a celebrity and gained him great wealth.

The recent film *The Invisible Woman* (with Ralph Fiennes as the writer) begins with a

#### performance of Dickens' play The Frozen Deep (1857), a collaboration with Collins. Ellen Ternan (aged eighteen at the time) was one of the professional actresses hired and eventually became Dickens' mistress, precipitating his separation from his wife the following year.

Even though the writer did not himself enjoy theatrical fame, the rich cavalcade of characters (Samuel Pickwick, Pip, Nell and her grandfather, Fagin, Bill Sikes and everybody's favourite Christmas curmudgeon, Ebenezer Scrooge) and incidents in his novels meant that the works were turned into plays soon after publication – though not by the author and therefore causing him great frustration! In our own time the same works have found a new audience as television presentations. (I saw a wonderful serialization of Bleak House (2005), starring Charles Dance, Anna Maxwell Martin and Gillian Anderson as Lady Honoria Dedlock). And the musical Oliver! (1960, with music and lyrics by Lionel Bart) gave us yet another perspective on this writer, who always had a great story to tell.

And now it's your turn! Dickens left us with one unfinished novel at his death in 1870 – The Mystery of Edwin Drood. You can help complete this final work by finding out what happened to young Edwin and whose hand did the dastardly deed!
