ALL CREATURES GREAT AND SMALL

Expanding Your Theatre Vocabulary - the 64th in a continuing series

If I asked you to name your favourite nursery rhyme or fairy tale (both rich sources for traditional pantomimes), what would you choose? Would it be Puss in Boots, The Three Little Pigs, Little Red Riding-Hood, Goldilocks and the Three Bears, Little Bo-Peep? Animals, animals and more animals!

nimals have been a staple component of story-telling, particularly stories intended for children, for a very long time. We all know Aesop's fable of The Tortoise and the Hare. In a race between the two, the hare, confident of his greater speed and agility, falls asleep on the path, while the tortoise plods steadily along and crosses the finish line as the winner. Aesop (620-564 BCE) is actually describing an aspect of human existence, which plays out with animal characters and the ending is usually an unfortunate one - that is, unfortunate decisions lead to unfortunate consequences. The Greek writer used creatures familiar to his readers horses, foxes, dogs and birds. Interestingly, very few of his stories concern reptiles and those about frogs portray the species as arrogant, boastful and wishing to improve their station in life.

Just as Aesop made connection with his readers by using familiar animals and landscapes, the same can be seen in the work of the German brothers Wilhelm and Jacob Grimm. The brothers were concerned that many folk tales and legends, which began as oral traditions handed down from generation to generation, were being lost. Their aim was to collect these, not only as a source for reading

enjoyment, but for what the tales indicated about the country, its history and its people. Kinder- und Hausmärchen, containing 86 folk tales, was published in 1812 and was an instant success. The animals of the stories were of the woods - bears, deer, rabbits and of course wolves! Not all of the animals are friendly and this is deliberate. Aesop's fables have a moral and are intended to present a situation from which a lesson may be learned. The Grimms' tales, although more extensive, also have something to teach us - A certain type of behaviour is to be encouraged. Stupid, unkind behaviour will not go unpunished and the outcome is often harsh. Charles Perrault, the 17th century French anthologist whose collection of fairy tales appeared in 1697 and were incorporated by the Grimm brothers into later editions of their work, wrote a tale called Diamonds and Toads. The daughter in this story (who has the misfortune to insult a fairy) suffers the consequence of having a toad or snake fall out of her mouth whenever she speaks.

A frog or a toad obviously cannot instill the fear that a bear or a wolf can. But their less-than-pleasant appearance and clammy skin means that, in the written fairy tale record, they do not fare well. In the Aarne-Thompson-Uther classification scheme, published in 1910 and an examination of thousands of tales from Europe and the Near East, Der Froschkönig belongs in category 440, stories of couples where the male suitor is a supernatural being — or someone with a slimy, green, outside!

Now, having given you the background, just forget everything you've read, because Cheryl Theriault and Brenda Tyedmers have put a whole new spin on this old tale. Yes, there's a frog and yes, there's a princess and yes, you can be sure there's a whole lot of fun for the actors and audience alike! - Judy Reade
