One of the Great Legends

Expanding Your Theatre Vocabulary - the 44th in a continuing series...

As much as one would like to think that King Arthur was an historical figure, after reading several articles in preparation for this column, the consensus would appear to be that he is a fictional creation. But, as so often happens, what begins as references in Welsh and Breton (French) sources to a mighty warrior whose speciality is dispatching fanciful monsters, takes on a life of its own, adding elements with every telling, until it is impossible to separate fiction from what may, or may not, have been a factual basis.

The earliest literary accounts place Arthur as ruling during the late 5th and early 6th centuries. Based in England, he fought against the invaders coming from Saxony. Geoffrey of Monmouth, who produces the first narrative account of Arthur's rule in Historia Regum Britanniae (History of the Kings of Britain), appearing in 1138, makes claims that, through his bravery and the support of his Knights, the King was able to expand

his influence to Ireland, Iceland, the Orkney Islands and even Norway. Geoffrey also introduces other characters, events and places which become standard in subsequent texts. (We're centuries away from copyright protection of course in 1138, so wholesale and partial borrowing from author to author is common!). He names Uther Pendragon as Arthur's father; the wizard Merlin; Guinevere, Arthur's Queen; the sword Excalibur and the King's final resting place, Avalon.

Arthurian The stories are just as popular in France as they are in England, since they fit well with the established literary style of romances - tales of chivalrous deeds displaying loyalty, bravery and adherence to moral and religious codes. These romances, popular during the 12th and 13th centuries, shift the attention away somewhat from Arthur and introduce the Knights Lancelot, Galahad, Gawain, and the love story of Tristan and Isolde.

With the number of tales,

and their sources, multiplying, the English writer Thomas Malory attempts to draw everything together in a single work, Le Morte d'Arthur (1485). As Geoffrev of Monmouth's work had served as a first benchmark, Malory's becomes the second, and then Alfred Lord Tennyson's Idylls of the King (1859) the third. The legend therefore, constantly being revised, reinterpreted expanded, and with the inevitable musical (by Alan Jay Lerner and Frederick Loewe) appearing in 1960.

Having taken you through Arthur's history, I now have to ask you to set all you know aside! True, our pantomime is set in Camelot, the King's principal court and true, Arthur is about to marry Guinevere, which some folk aren't happy about - but beyond that you'll have to wait and see. And did I mention the disappearing piece of furniture - I'm sure that wasn't in anybody's version! Hope you enjoy our pantomime!
