ell, it's officially Spring. Let's hope Mother Nature is watching the calendar and doesn't throw any more winter weather at us. On that note, I'd like to thank the team of *Best of Friends* for working through the worst of the winter weather to get to rehearsals and performances, and to those intrepid theatre goers who braved the elements on the closing night of the show.

Activity never stops at the Pond Playhouse. No sooner had the set of *Best of Friends* been struck (i.e. dismantled) than the cast and crew of our next production, *Dancing at Lughnasa* by Brian Friel (directed by Louise Renault) had taken over the stage.

On March 19th, Judy Reade, TAG's Props & Costumes Mistress, directed her crew of helpers to move the costume items stored in the backstage loft to their new home in the former equipment room on the second floor above the lobby. Thanks go to all those who turned out to form the "accessory brigade" that moved everything through the building and up the stairs in record time. Special accolades go to the time-challenged trio who turned out extra early and got everything out of the loft and into the house. You know who you are.

Those of you who attended *Dead Guilty* last summer may remember that we asked all audience members to fill out a survey to give the board an idea of the things that were most important to our patrons. There were a number of categories including the physical comfort of the theatre and the type of plays you'd like to see on the TAG stage. The things that jumped out at us most were comments regarding the lack of space in the lobby, the amount of leg room in some of the seats, and the lack of air-conditioning.

We can't deal with all the problems at once, so after much deliberation over fish cakes and Eggs Benny, the Building Committee has recommended that this summer's renovation project be the enlargement of the lobby. A two-story addition will be built on the front of the building to create a larger, more comfortable space for patrons, more washrooms and a more efficient ticket area and bar. The additional space on the second story will give us workshop, meeting and temporary rehearsal space.



#### **Dancing at Lughnasa**

The action of this nostalgic play is told through the memory of an illegitimate son as he remembers the five women who raised him: his mother and four maiden aunts. He is only seven in 1936, the year his elderly uncle, a priest, returns after serving for twenty-five years as a missionary in a Ugandan leper colony. For the young boy, two other disturbances occur that summer. The sisters acquire their first radio, whose music transforms them from correct Catholic women to shrieking, stomping banshees in their own kitchen. And he meets his father for the first time, a charming Welsh drifter who strolls up the lane and sweeps his mother away in an elegant dance across the fields. From these small events spring the cracks that destroy the foundation of the family forever. But this haunting play is Friel's tribute to the spirit and valour of the past and its people.

ur production of Norm Foster's *The Melville Boys* has been cast, with Frank MacLean, Rory Young, Leslie Milne and Kim Parkhill playing Lee, Owen, Mary and Loretta respectively. Show dates at The Studio, Neptune are June 8<sup>th</sup> to 12<sup>th</sup>, with tickets going on sale at the Neptune box office in May.



The play is centered around two brothers (one carrying a very big

problem) at their Aunt's lakeside camp for a weekend. They're away from the plastics factory where they both work, away from family and fiancé, a whole weekend of fishing, beer, and camaraderie. However, two sisters appear, paddling down the lake—local residents, no doubt. Now, what could possibly transpire at Auntie's camp, by the lake, out in the woods, when two girls meet two boys?

It's all very innocent and maybe just a little awkward until the local legion dance comes up in conversation. The story follows our newly-mets as they return from the dance to the cottage, etc.

Plays by Fredericton-based Foster have become internationally popular, and we are pleased to bring the humour and tender discoveries of *The Melville Boys* to Neptune's Studio stage.

# **Expanding Your Theatre Vocabulary**

#### Ireland to England and Back Again

(The eleventh in a continuing series)

Brian Friel (b. 1939, Omagh), the author of *Dancing at Lughnasa*, has had a somewhat easier passage than many of his compatriots of past generations. Friel has been able to write in a home environment, for theatres and theatre companies dedicated to the staging of Irish plays, within a culture supportive of the work of Irish writers, directors, and performers. This is in direct contrast to past centuries, when many of the most prominent Irish playwrights had to learn their trade and forge a reputation outside the country,

usually in England.


Oliver Goldsmith Richard Brinsley Sheridan, two of the most successful playwrights in 18th century London, were born in Ireland, Goldsmith in Roscommon and Sheridan in Dublin. Goldsmith's most famous piece She Stoops to Conquer was written in 1773, and is still regularly performed. Sheridan's father was the manager of the Smock Alley Theatre in Dublin, and Sheridan himself became the owner of London's famed Drury Lane Theatre, which he bought from David Garrick.

In 1990, TAG presented

The Importance of Being Earnest, the most famous work of yet another 'transposed' Irishman, Oscar Wilde (full name Oscar Fingal O'Flahertie Wills Wilde). Wilde studied at Trinity College in Dublin, then won a scholarship to Magdalen College in Oxford. The production of Lady Windemere's Fan in London in 1892 set him on the road to fame and eventually made him the dominant influence in British theatre at the end of the Victorian era.

Yet another Dubliner who made the move to London was George Bernard Shaw (1856-1950). At the age of 20, Shaw moved to

the English capital intending to become a novelist. He was also interested in politics, however, and began using his written output to promote his socialist agenda. In 1986, Shaw's Candida was presented at TAG, and his Pygmalion was a TAG favourite of the 1930s. You may know Pygmalion better in its musical adaptation as My Fair Lady, a transition of which purists may not have approved, but which certainly benefited the National Gallery of Ireland, to which Shaw left the royalties from his work!
