
Missed the live shows in October? Not comfortable attending live theatre? Mrs. Walford: A Month in Halsey Street

Episode 6 - The Lobby Photograph – Then and Now

Those of you who are familiar with the layout of the Pond Playhouse will know that, in the entrance, to the left of the bar is a noticeboard which we call the 'Lobby Display'. It's the place where, for every production, the audience can view photographs of cast members and those who work behind the scenes. It's one way of acknowledging the combined efforts of many people to provide you, the audience, with an enjoyable evening's entertainment. Bruce Goodick, for several years now, has provided sterling service in preparing these photographs, not only the usual headshots which you see in the Lobby, but the more informal shots taken at rehearsals (which can be viewed on the TAG website - from the menu on the homepage, select On Stage, and then Photo Galleries).

This is the display practice now, but recently I was able to see an example of a Halifax 'lobby photograph' from the 1920s, before Theatre Arts Guild came into existence. I've mentioned this before I know, but for new readers, TAG dates only from 1931, but the two organizations which merged in 1931 to create the Guild were active in the previous decade. My thanks go to Steve Lane, who shared details of a photograph which belonged to his grandmother and features a member of the Halifax Dramatic and Musical Club (one of our founding groups). This 'lobby photograph' from 1924 or 1925 shows an actor from the Club's presentation of A Country Girl, a popular operetta by a very popular composer of the time, Lionel Monckton, now almost forgotten. The actor's name was Wilfred Marshall and his lobby photograph shows him in full costume and makeup as Granfer Mummery, posed in the studio of Climo's branch in Halifax. The Climo photography business was founded in Saint John at the end of the 19th century and continued in operation until 1969. This formal portraiture was the custom of the time and the pictures of the cast and Director would appear in the local newspapers, which could be counted on to provide extensive coverage of the Club's productions. I have not been able yet to find the year in which this Club was formed, but the theatre archives section of the Dalhousie University Archives holds programmes from The Quaker Girl (music again by Monckton and performed in 1926) and The Fortune Teller (performed in 1929, with music by Victor Herbert, who was achieving in America the same kind of success Monckton enjoyed in England). The presentation of Mr. Marshall might be different and more formal than we know today, but the purpose is the same – we celebrate our actors and are willing to suspend reality for a time in the theatre, whilst we marvel at their ability to create new characters for us.

Take a look at the display board next time you attend a production – it takes teamwork to produce a play, so let's hear it for the TAG teams of the 2021-2022 season!
