

Ms. Shields made a huge contribution to Canadian drama and we are pleased her work has been enjoyed by so may of our patrons.

Our next main stage show, *How it Works* by Nova Scotia author Daniel MacIvor is in rehearsal. Mr. MacIvor is an eminent Canadian playwright and film maker with such works as *Marion Bridge, Soldiers Dreams* etc. All of us have probably met people like the characters in *How it Works*, which is set in and around Halifax. The challenges they encounter hopefully are not as familiar to us, but you will enjoy getting to know them and seeing how a huge twist is resolved.

The Old and the New

Expanding Your Theatre Vocabulary - the 31st in a continuing series...

Sometimes the stars align in their courses and I find the 'hook' I need for my next contribution to the TAG Newsletter! For this issue, when I was contemplating what to write about our next presentation, it was seeing a production of Medea, in the Dunn Theatre, performed by students from the Dalhousie Theatre Department. And yes, I can sense the question formulating in your mind..."What does a modern Canadian piece (it was written here in Nova Scotia in 2005) have to do with a Greek tragedy from 431 BCE, about a woman who will never win the title of Mom-of-the-Year?!" And my answer is that this juxtaposition gives me an opportunity to discuss a topic which I have mentioned before in this series - the theatre of Ancient Greece.

It is to this ancient culture that we must look for the foundations of the dramatic art which, centuries later, produces what McIvor himself describes as 'the reinvention of family' among Al, his former wife Donna, their daughter Brooke and Al's new girlfriend, Christine. But, like any other art form, it develops over time, and although we call both

Medea and How It Works plays, Euripides would need to make many mental adjustments to make sense of what you are about to see on the TAG stage.

In Ancient Greece, theatre grew from the celebrations which accompanied religious festivals particularly those honouring Dionysus, the God of Wine, Fertility and Rebirth. Playwrights whose work was presented at these gatherings were actually in competition with each other, since prizes were awarded (this being the reason for the establishment of a long list of conditions for the action, the setting and the players - all now abandoned of course!). How It Works contains elements both tragic and comic - an absolute no-no for Euripides. For the Ancients, tragedy and comedy were two very distinct genres. Medea's story is composed of tragic happenings from beginning - her husband Jason's plan to marry a local princess – to end – the death of her two sons by her own hand.

How It Works also moves from past to present and back again – yes, another old rule broken. For the Greeks, it was thought best that

the action be continuous. Not only that, but the action should occur in a single place. Any violent or disturbing incidents, and certainly any deaths, were not to be shown - they must happen offstage and the audience must be informed in some other way, usually by having a messenger rush in and provide all the details. And did I mention the Chorus? No, there won't be a singing trio hanging around Al, Donna, Brooke and Christine, but the Greeks could not have done without this group (all men, with anywhere from 3 to 50 taking part), an extension of the singing group whose hymns were a part of the religious feasts. The Chorus chimes in at various points in the action, asks questions, gives advice and comments on how the intentions of the characters are to be viewed and whether or not they meet accepted standards.

Euripides' audience was left in no doubt about the consequences of Medea's actions, but McIvor's players must find their own way in the world – No Gods looking over their shoulders and no Chorus either! ~ Judy Reade
