

Director's Notes

Wendy Lill's Corker provides a unique opportunity for the audience. In this play lies an opportunity for us to consider where we, as individuals, stand on issues and conundrums within our social system while also taking note of the awkwardness and inconvenience some relationships can bring to our lives; relationships we are unwittingly born into as well as those which are thrust upon us. On the outside, looking in, we may see ourselves: we may see each other. On the inside, looking out, we may realize our truth; we may reach an understanding - in who we are - and what we are - and what we could be for each other.

This very important and candid look at our very real world is brilliantly brought to life by the extremely talented cast and crew of Corker. The subtle quirks in relationships between the characters are played both honestly and realistically with resulting great impact. The players keep the focus on the story and its message; a message which has not lost its significance since this play was originally created around a Halifax locale in 1995. Unfortunately, perhaps this in itself, the continuing need to address the same issues sixteen years later, underscores most evidently the importance of seeing this play for ourselves right now.

It can be a captivating journey and a chance to know ourselves.

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About the Playwright

Wendy Lill received a B.A. in political science from York University in 1970. She remained in Toronto after graduation, continuing to pursue her interest in writing before moving to Winnipeg in 1979 to work as a journalist for the CBC. She now lives in Dartmouth, Nova Scotia, with her husband and two children.

Lill has been the president of Integration
Action Group - a provincial advocacy
group for children with special needs; vice
president (Eastern) of the Playwrights
Union of Canada; a co-founder of the
Eastern Front Theatre Company; a member
of the NS Writers' Federation; and a past
member of the Board of the Dartmouth Day
Care Centre. Between June 1997 and June
2004, Lill was an MP from the Dartmouth
Riding in Nova Scotia for the New Democratic Party.



Wendy Lill has not only written extensively for radio, magazines, film, television and the stage, but has also been active in national politics. In 1979, while with CBC Radio in Winnipeg, Lill wrote her first play, On the Line, to dramatize the plight of striking Winnipeg garment industry workers. Since then, her plays have gone on to examine the Canadian women's suffrage movement (The Fighting Days); aboriginal-white relations (The Occupation of Heather Rose, Sisters); pedophilia and mass hysteria (All Fall Down); the slashing of social programs (Corker); and the dangerous lives of coal miners in her adopted province of Nova Scotia (The Glace Bay Miners' Museum)

Her skill at turning the potentially deadly "issue play" into compelling, emotionally charged theatre has resulted in four nominations for the Governor General's Drama Award.

Will Brewer (Corker) Will's acting career began when he was a child as a regular performer with Theatre Fredericton's Christmas Pantomime. He later developed and starred in a piece he produced for the Fredericton Shelter fundraiser Big Hearts for the Homeless at the Fredericton Playhouse. Will wrote and performed a monologue for a Youth Project production at the Bus Stop Theatre, during Halifax Pride Week 2009. In December, he danced with Team Possibles Dancers and played the part of the town crier in The Christmas Story. He was also a dancer with Team Troupe in performances at the Law Courts Building on Nocturne.

Frank MacLean (Albert Glenny) Frank has been involved in community theatre for well over three decades but still tends to gravitate towards TAG.
