

Nunsense

Nunsense is a comedic musical that follows the story of five nuns who findthemselves in a challenging situation after the rest of their sisterhood passesaway which is traced back to vichyssoise soup prepared by Sister Julia Child of God. Left with the task of managing a fundraiser to raise

money for the burial of their deceased sisters, the remaining nuns, including ballet-loving Sister Leo, streetwise Sister Robert Anne, befuddled Sister Mary Amnesia, the Mother Superior Sister Mary Regina, and mistress of the novices Sister Mary Hubert, decide to stage a talent show. Throughout the show, the nuns encounter various misadventures and obstacles, all while trying to put together a successful performance. The humor in *Nunsense* stems from the catchy songs and irreverent comedy, which often pokes fun at the convent life and the characters' distinct personalities. The combination of witty dialogue, amusing situations, and light-hearted satire creates a hilarious spoof that will keep you entertained and laughing.

### **TAG ONLINE**

TAG Digital, The Theatre Arts Guild virtual stage, started as a response to the COVID-19 lockdowns in June 2020, in collaboration with The Telescope Theatre Project. Its aim is to share new, familiar, and obscure works of poetry, prose, and plays, and provide an educational, relaxing, and creative process for participants who desire to take part in a production, but are unable to commit to the demands of a live production. Since September 2020, they have released audio and video productions, made primarily available on YouTube.

The Telescope Theatre Project was a creative, collaborative cooperative of storytelling enthusiasts, with interests in poetry, prose, and plays. Formed in 2013 by Kaylon Fraser, Melinda Antle, and Joshua Law, their ultimate goal was to explore new, familiar, and lost works, and share them with artists and audiences. Following the amalgamation with TAG in 2021, the Project dissolved, but Telescope remains as a producer within TAG.


My good friend from TAG, Nick Jupp asked me in 1995 if I wanted to volunteer with the Theatre as Bar Manager. The rest is history.

### "The Hills Are Alive!" Nuns on Stage and Screen

TAG's upcoming presentation of Nunsense is a tuneful comedy about four nuns with a big problem and Bedford Players' recent *Drinking Habit* again features nuns. Why this fascination with nuns? Why is the most popular musical of recent decades and the winner of nine Academy Awards about a nun? This question sent me on a search to see what pieces TAG had chosen in the past to portray those who wear the habit and on a broader search to find out how nuns have been portrayed on the big screen.

It seemed to me that this fascination can be divided into two streams. Either we take a secret enjoyment in seeing these women step outside their cloistered environment and commit mayhem, thereby revealing their human nature, or, on a more serious note, we see their true commitment to convent life and a willingness to make sacrifices (sometime the ultimate sacrifice), displaying in the process a deep faith and a compassion for all humankind. And being behind convent walls does not always guarantee that the sisters are shielded from the problems which beset the rest of us.

TAG's production of *Doubt* by Patrick Shanley in 2014 serves as a good example of the stress to be found behind the walls. The Mother Superior of the Convent School is disturbed about the attention being paid by the Parish priest to one boy. The boy's mother is anxious not to create problems which could possibly lead to her son losing his place in the private institution. Race is a factor too in this dilemma, since the boy black in a school of predominately white children. The nun's doubt (hence the title), will not leave her. The audience travels with this religious and her community as she wrestles with the problem – loyalty to her students or loyalty to the priest who is her superior?

Wrestling with problems and the pull of the outside world are hallmarks of many of the films which feature nuns. Maria von Trapp is, after all, not suited to life in the convent, but still must leave her companions, acquire the care of seven children (and a husband!), and sing a plethora of unforgettable songs in the process!

Having to wear a habit for a role seems to have attracted some of the best actresses in the past. I am no longer youthful(!), so can remember being moved by Audrey Hepburn in The Nun's Story (1959), where the problem is the sexual tension which builds up between this sister and the surgeon with whom she works in a Congolese hospital. My mother read Black Narcissus by Rumer Godden, made into a film in 1947 and starring Deborah Kerr. The setting is the Indian Himalayas and the story follows the unsuccessful attempts of a group of nuns to establish a school and hospital in the mountains. And on the topic of tension between a sister and a parish priest (but presented in a much lighter tone) Ingrid Bergman and Bing Crosby sparred in Bells of St. Mary's (1945), with more singing obviously! For more comedic examples, we need look no further than Whoopi Goldberg's Sister Act (films 1 and 2, with a third announced) and, bordering on fantasy, the Flying Nun series starring Sally Field from 1967-1970.

To borrow the Monty Python phrase, "And now for something completely different". Sister Mary Ignatius Explains It All For You (in TAG's 1997/98 season) by Christopher Durang is definitely comedic and at the same time a bitter satire on the rigid doctrines of the Catholic Church and how such doctrines have impacted the lives of four of Sister Mary's former students. This nun has very strong views on the world and SIN, which are expressed to her current class = the audience. Unfortunately, her former students have all transgressed in one way or another and have suffered mentally as a result of their time at the school. The resolution to this dilemma is quite unexpected and brutal. Durang, raised a Catholic, received heavy criticism for this play and there were efforts to stop performances.

The choice of Sister Mary Ignatius came at a period during TAG's history when avant-garde, 'angry' authors, both British and American, were being highlighted. Before the Durang play, TAG had presented the first play by Wendy Wasserstein, Uncommon Women and Other Stories in 1987 and three of the plays by Joe Orton, a playwright considered outrageous by many at the time. If nothing else, this brief look at the world of nuns on stage and screen has certainly made me consider those who have chosen the convent life as individuals, rather than under a group heading. I hope that you can join us for a look at four of their number in *Nunsense*, which I am placing squarely on the comedy side of the equation!
