

TAG Digital, The Theatre Arts Guild virtual stage, started as a response to the COVID-19 lockdowns in June 2020, in collaboration with The Telescope Theatre Project. Its aim is to share new, familiar, and obscure works of poetry, prose, and plays, and provide an educational, relaxing, and creative process for participants who desire to take part in a production, but are unable to commit to the demands of a live production. Since September 2020, they have released audio and video productions, made primarily available on YouTube. The Telescope Theatre Project was a creative, collaborative cooperative of storytelling enthusiasts, with interests in poetry, prose, and plays. Formed in 2013 by Kaylon Fraser, Melinda Antle, and Joshua Law, their ultimate goal was to explore new, familiar, and lost works, and share them with artists and audiences. Following the amalgamation with TAG in 2021, the Project dissolved, but Telescope remains as a producer within TAG.

# MEMORIES OF... Santa Claus the Panto

### Murder(ous) plays at TAG!

It would seem that, despite our love of pantomime, musicals, romantic comedies and other genres, the supporters of TAG also love a good murder, not every season, but our list of productions (on the website, look under 'On Stage' for complete details) shows that we dip into mystery and mayhem every three years or so. And there's no brownie points for guessing who is our favourite author in this category – the "Queen of Crime" herself, Dame Agatha Christie. We've presented six of her stories, including *The Mousetrap*, staged in 1952 in England and now the longest-running play anywhere in the world. Surprisingly, TAG has only presented this piece once, in October of 1972. Time perhaps, to give it another airing before a younger audience whose members won't already know the ending!

In my opinion, one of the reasons Agatha Christie is so popular results from her being a writer of both novels and plays who is dependable. As the audience, we know that a crime has been committed or is about to be committed, we have been introduced to all the characters and know something about their background and their relationships - to sum up, we possess all the clues. The onus is then on us, the audience, to work out who the murderer is, and Mrs. Christie is very good at withholding that knowledge until the last moment - "Oh, so it was her! Well, I didn't see that coming."

We needn't delve very far into the TAG murderous list before coming up with the reason for all the evil-doing – it's either love or money and very likely both. *Murder Mistaken* by Janet Green which played in October 1954, revolves around a successful businessman who marries for money (first to an older woman and there's another staple of a murder tale). However, after wife number one is dispatched, he marries again, only to discover that wife number two keeps a tight hold of the purse strings. Planning to repeat the process, he plots a second removal, only to meet a prospective third bride, with no cash, but a much prettier face. Decisions, decisions ...

Just where all the money is kept often forms the basis of a plot. In *Night Must Fall*, presented in both 1969 and 1998, the cash is in a safe in the middle of the room, but it's not only the safe which catches our attention. There's also a hatbox, kept under the servant's bed which might (or might not) be connected to the disappearance of a young woman last seen in the woods which surround the house. A variant on this theme is *Rope* (an oldie but goodie, having been written by Patrick Hamilton in 1929 and at TAG in 2019), in which two university students murder a classmate and store the body in a chest in their apartment. Wanting to take matters further, they then invite friends to a party and use said chest as a buffet, on which the food is displayed.

We might be doubtful as to the content of the chest, of course, but TAG has presented an equal number of plays in which we have no doubt who killed whom. Dial M for Murder by Frederic Knott (written in 1952, but at TAG in 2004) makes us a witness to the murder scene – the catch here is that the woman wielding the weapon is supposed to be the victim, not the villain and the question then becomes whether or not before the end of the play the real culprit will be caught. It's complex, but hubby is eventually led away in handcuffs. We get to witness another murder - by an ingenious strategy – in Deathtrap by Ira Levin (2011) and (another golden oldie) Double Indemnity by James M. Cain, in which an attempt to claim a double insurance payout (which will result if the holder of the policy dies as a result of an accident), doesn't go quite as planned.

In murder mysteries there are plays, and this holds good for all genres, which don't fit the norm and make us follow an uncommon path to arrive at the truth. Suddenly Last Summer, a one-act play by Tennessee Williams (April 1973 at TAG) has the main character placed in a mental institution by her aunt. Catharine's cousin has mysteriously disappeared the previous summer and though she witnessed how this happened, she is too traumatized to give out any information. The truth is eventually 'shocked' out of her, and it's what no one wants to hear. Elizabeth Taylor played the lead in the film of 1959. Blood Relations (1994 TAG production) by the New Brunswick playwright Sharon Pollock has Lizzie Borden as one of its characters. She is befriended by an actress interested in what really happened in August of 1892 in Fall River, Massachusetts. The narrative is turned on its head by then having Lizzie and the actress change places – and a confession is still not forthcoming, but we perhaps understand what motivated the brutal slaying of Lizzie's father and stepmother.

I hope that this brief survey has shown you that perhaps there is no such thing as a 'typical' murder, certainly not in the theatre anyway and its sometimes quite the test for the audience, when they're not anxiously gripping the side of their seat! I wonder what motives are lurking in *Murder Tonight* by longtime TAG member Nick Jupp and what the outcome will be? You have the opportunity to find out March 7-23, right here at TAG!
